Is your company on board for Tomorrow?

The *Tomorrow Project* has been busy working with companies around Alberta to promote the study. We would love to have your company involved!

Host a 'lunch and learn', or distribute questionnaires to your colleagues and help us learn more about the causes of cancer.

In 2012, we have held 21 "lunch and learn" presentations at workplaces across the province. We have also set up four mobile study centres so employees can complete the physical measurements and sample collection portion of the study without having to leave their office building.

We are looking forward to working with even more organizations across Alberta. If you or someone you know is interested, we will send you posters to put up around your office, as well as an e-mail invitation to send to your colleagues outlining the program. We'll also drop off study questionnaires for you to distribute.

The companies that have been a part of the *Tomorrow Project* so far are happy to promote the study at their workplace. They report that their employees feel great pride in being able to participate in research that may help determine the causes of cancer and other diseases.

It is also helpful for the company's reputation for community involvement, as corporate participants receive recognition in the media for their effort in expanding our study.

Special Report: On the Road with the *Tomorrow Project*

Waking up early in the morning in a farflung town or city in Alberta has become the norm for the *Tomorrow Project's* Provincial Study Centre Coordinator Kathleen Murdoch, and her team of eight research assistants and three lab assistants.

"The provincial team works 12-hour days for seven days straight, and depending on how far we're going, some days all we do is drive," says Murdoch.

The *Tomorrow Project* needs to reach out to people all over Alberta who are between 35-69 years old and cancerfree, to ensure good representation from different areas and not just the urban population.

Although the *Tomorrow Project* has permanent centres in Calgary and Edmonton, Murdoch and her team are the ones who make collection of data from other areas possible.

While being away from family and friends for up to a week at a time can be tough, Murdoch says there's great camaraderie between the 12 team members, who all started working on the project around the same time.

"We all feel a great sense of fulfillment for helping contribute towards cancer research," says Jide Sotunbo, a Project Assistant on the Provincial team.

"Working closely alongside people from all over Alberta who share that altruistic purpose is definitely rewarding."

It takes the team about 30-45 minutes to load everything into the *Tomorrow Project's* 24-foot cube van, and about 1.5 hours to unload and set up the study centre.

When the team isn't traveling too far from their Calgary base, they can conduct about 30 physical measurements per day. On days that don't require set-up, the team can see upwards of 65 people in one day.

"We pack absolutely everything we'll need into our van; from the centrifuge that spins the blood that is collected from participants, to a mobile server, lab equipment and computers," says Murdoch.

At the end of each trip, all the equipment is taken out of the van, the participant data is uploaded onto the main AHS server, and all the surveys and biological samples are processed and securely stored at the main site in Calgary.

The study centre is usually held in the conference/event room of the hotel they are staying in, making it easier for the team and saving travel time. They've also held study centres in community halls, churches and schools.

The longest drive the team completed was to Fort McMurray, where the team travelled 9 hours (from Calgary). Kathleen feels it was an important trek to reach many of the Northern Albertans that would not have been able to come to a Calgary or Edmonton Study Centre otherwise.

Who's Who in the Tomorrow Project

Kenn Bur of Leduc, AB, had been thinking a lot about cancer—specifically, his wife's recently diagnosed breast cancer—when he saw one of our branded "Count Me In 4 Tomorrow" vehicles driving on Highway 2.

Intrigued, when he got home, he went to the website advertised on the side of the van to learn more.

"I was very impressed with the straight-forward science and bold ambitiousness of the project," he says. "Researchers need much more information about the triggers of cancer and other diseases and the only way to acquire this preventative information is to proactively gather statistical data from tens of thousands of people."

Bur was more than happy to sign up to be one of those people. He was driven by his desire to prevent breast cancer from afflicting more families.

"My wife was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2011," he says. Beyond supporting her through treatment, he wanted to do more. "I wanted to do something to change the current unacceptable status quo of breast cancer on behalf of my wife and for my two daughters."

Bur was impressed with everyone he met while participating in the *Tomorrow Project*, the diverse tests they administered and the "meticulous testing protocols" they followed.

"All testing teams were also very friendly and efficient with my time," he says. "I especially appreciated that I was provided a summary report of all my baseline test data—the free, personalized report should be a huge inducement for anyone just interested in learning more about their body's core measurements."

Bur "enthusiastically recommends" everyone in Alberta to sign up for the *Tomorrow Project*.

"Anyone who truly wants to make a real difference against cancer and other major diseases should invest two minutes to make an appointment," he says.

"For just an hour or so of your time, you'll meet a lot of great people, get a personalized report on some baseline health measurements, and make a meaningful contribution to the health of all Canadians."

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More Men Needed!

Currently, the Tomorrow Project has nearly twice as many women enrolled as men.


"The probability of an Albertan man developing cancer within his lifetime is 1 in 2, whereas for women, it is 1 in 3, meaning that the probability of developing cancer is slightly higher in men than in women," says Dr. Paula Robson, Scientific Director for the Tomorrow Project.

"In addition, around 1 in 6 men will develop prostate cancer. We also know that men are more likely than women to develop bladder cancer, stomach cancer and liver cancer1. What we don't know is why these differences happen. If we can understand more about differences in cancer risk in men and women, medical scientists may be able to develop better risk reduction strategies in the future."

To do this, the Tomorrow Project needs to enroll roughly equal numbers of men and women. Currently, around twothirds of all enrolled participants are women. The Tomorrow Project would like to balance out that ratio, with your help.
